Activity 2.13: "THE ROAD TO RESPECT"

Time: 1 h

PREPARATION

- Student worksheet (see Appendix): one for each group.

INTRODUCTION

Welcome routine:

Greet the students, write the date and hour on the blackboard, say the date and time out loud, instruct them to take out their materials for the lesson.

- *Hello, good morning/afternoon.*
- *Are you all okay? Is everything all right?*
- *Today is the ... (date) and it's ... (time).*
- *We are going to begin (continue) lesson (or activity) number ...*
- *Would you please, take out your material? Okay, let's begin.*

ACTIVITY

Opening activity:

Explain the meaning of the following terms: *moral, civic, take care of, road safety, rule, be careful with, consumer, spend/waste, peace, socio-economic background, equal/equality, environment/environmental/nature, health/healthy, right/wrong.* Explain what the students are going to do in this lesson: they will learn the importance of appropriate civic education and the

	<p>importance of respecting these values in order to become an ideal citizen.</p> <p>Main activity: The students get a hand-out with the "Definition Puzzle" (see Appendix). In groups they match both parts of the definition so it makes sense. Then they copy these sentences in their notebook and give simple examples of some of those points.</p> <p>Closing activity:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - <i>What is your opinion of ... (the topic)?</i> - <i>Did you like this activity? Why? What did you find most helpful in understanding the topic? Is there anything you didn't find helpful? Explain.</i>

DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITIES	
<p>The class is divided into groups and the teacher hands out one copy of the "Definition Puzzle" to each group. The students then match the definitions with the values and/or education mentioned in the activity. Afterwards, they copy the list of definitions in their notebooks and give a simple example of that situation in their own words.</p>
